Education Abroad: Reflection Assignment Guidelines

CIE hopes that your time abroad is academically, socially, and culturally enriching. Part of a successful experience abroad is the ability to critically reflect on that experience and articulate it well to others.

Consequently, in order to complete the general education requirement for either Beyond the Classroom or Diverse and Global Perspectives through education abroad, you must:

1. Submit the General Education Contract (see reverse) to CIE **PRIOR to departing**.
2. Write a reflection paper as outlined below, or complete a written reflective project, such as a vlog or photo journal, as discussed and agreed upon with your Faculty sponsor.

Deadlines:

- For programs offering transfer credit: reflection due by first day of the semester following the conclusion of the education abroad program.
- For programs offered for UMW credit: reflection due by the last day of classes for the applicable UMW term.

Tips for Reflection:

- Plan in advance for this assignment by keeping a journal, mementos, or correspondence throughout your time abroad.
- Spend time observing throughout your experience: review and record specific events, meaningful conversations, sights, sounds, and smells of your new environment, etc.

Analysis

Although there is no page requirement for this assignment, in order to adequately reflect on the cultural aspects of your experience, a minimum four double-spaced page paper is recommended. College-level writing that has been spell-checked and proof read is expected.

In your assignment you should reflect on some or all of the following prompts:

Cultural Perspectives

- In what ways is the culture where you traveled similar to and different from your own? Discuss particular examples for each case.
- Discuss a time when the host country's culture shocked you or made you stop and reflect.
- While abroad, in what ways did you become more aware of your own culture's benefits, limitations, strengths, and biases?

Personal Values

- How were your personal values and beliefs challenged and/or changed during this experience?
- In what ways might your own culture/society benefit by learning from that of others, specifically from the one in which you were immersed?
- What was the single most useful or meaningful thing you learned through this experience?

Global Learning

Many employers highly value candidates who have had an education abroad experience, but only if the candidate shows how those experiences relate to their professional aspirations. How would you respond to a potential employer if they ask you these questions:

- What knowledge or skills acquired or developed while in college were most useful in this experience?
- Identify a problem or struggle that you encountered in this experience. How did you overcome it?
- After your time abroad, what are your strengths and weaknesses as they relate to your potential career field or academic discipline?
- What did you learn from your education abroad experience that would be valuable to us as your potential employer? Give a specific example.
