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GENERAL DESCRIPTION

English majors go in many directions after college. Some continue on to graduate school, law school, or other pre-professional programs. Some go into teaching: elementary, secondary, or college-level. Others head for journalism—newspapers, magazines, radio or television. Many move directly into careers in government, in the non-profit sector, and in business and industry. Wherever they go, the critical thinking abilities and communication skills they learned as English majors serve as the foundation for their career success.

English majors are sought out by employers for their ability to write clearly, analyze carefully, interpret thoughtfully, reflect deeply, organize effectively, think both creatively and analytically, work independently or as a part of a team, and perform many kinds of research and problem solving. Their training in oral communication and in many different forms of writing enables them to express themselves more eloquently. It also gives them highly practical skills to take into the workplace.

English majors develop a deep appreciation of the power of language and the beauty of the verbal arts. Through the study of linguistics, they gain not only knowledge of language, but also of the relations between language and society. Through the study of literature they gain an understanding of the richness and complexity of the human condition, learn to deal with difficult and complicated ideas, and develop the sensitivity and tolerance needed for any career in our modern world.
