Philosophy

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GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Philosophy is the branch of learning that critically examines the basic beliefs underlying our views of nearly everything. As such it is sometimes called "the most general science."

Philosophy is both critical and constructive. Philosophy has various branches in which these basic beliefs are examined: ethics, logic, theory of knowledge, philosophy of science, aesthetics, philosophy of religion, and the most general of all the branches of philosophy — metaphysics, are some of the specific areas of philosophical study.

The study of philosophy demands and fosters clear and systematic thinking. It requires the student to develop abilities to do research, think about the results, organize these results and express them in both oral and written form. In addition to developing these obviously useful skills, the study of philosophy enables students to create for themselves a basic understanding of civilization itself — to create an enduring framework with which to structure all the rest of the information they absorb in the increasingly complex world of today.

A bachelor's degree in philosophy can be applied to many beginning jobs in business, government, communications, and education, which are generally open to liberal arts graduates.
