

TITLE IX INFORMATION SHEET: STUDYING ABROAD

FOR FACULTY

SEXUAL ASSAULT AND STUDY ABROAD

- There is an increased risk of sexual assault while studying abroad when compared to on-campus assault rates, especially in non-English speaking countries (Kimble, Flack & Burbridge, 2013)
- Be aware of cultural norms in the abroad location, especially regarding gender and sexuality

REPORTING

- As a UMW faculty member, you are a responsible employee who is mandated to report such incidents to the Office of Title IX, Title IX Coordinator

- Know laws about sexual assault in the country and explain them to the student
- Find out if the location has trained sexual assault or crime victim advocates or services
- Remember to empower the student by respecting her/his decisions in reporting, seeking additional help, etc.
- Be aware that some countries may not give any rights to sexual assault victims and reporting criminally may not always be best for the student

WHAT TO DO IF A STUDENT IS ASSAULTED

- First make sure the student is in safe environment
- Keep in mind the student might have medical needs that need to be addressed:
 - o Injuries or STDs that need to be treated immediately; rape kit; a possible pregnancy
- Provide comfort/support:
 - o "You are not alone", "This is not your fault"
- The student may need an advocate for accompaniment to a police station, hospital, during legal proceedings, and/or for protection from blaming, shaming, or physical violence
- Let the student have as much control and decision-making power as possible
- Encourage the victim to receive counseling, therapy or other supportive services
- Never promise to keep the assault information private or confidential. Remember, you are a responsible employee for UMW.

WAYS TO AVOID VICTIM BLAMING

- Do NOT point out ways that the victim used poor judgment or placed herself/himself at risk
- Avoid all statements or attitudes that would imply blame, criticism or judgment
- Do not ask implying questions that can be harmful and emotionally damaging to the victim. Remember sexual assault is never the victims' fault; remind them of that. Examples of things NOT to say:
 - o "What were you wearing?"
 - o "How much did you drink?"
 - o "Did you do something to make him/her angry?"
 - o "It's just stress"
 - o "That person seems nice to me"
